The New Sports

In the USA, skateboarding is no longer just a sport. It is an 'extreme sport', just like snowboarding, inline skating and bicycle stunt riding. For three years the best athletes have been competing in these sports at the Extreme Games - or 'X-Games' for short. Each time the X-Games have been held, extreme sports have become more popular and more widely accepted. "X-Games are real" 17-year-old Duane Hartson, a spectator, told the *Los Angeles Times*. "They're not here today and gone tomorrow", he said. In June 1998, 14 million Americans watched the 11-day competition on TV. That is more than those who watched the World Cup soccer competition in France.

For many people, the attraction of the games lies in their risky nature. Not only are they dangerous, but in many American towns it is illegal to do them. Biologist Michael J. Dougherty of Colorado says that the X-game athletes are not ordinary people. "It would be interesting to do some blood-samples of X-game athletes and look at their DNA", he said. To psychologist Frank Farley of Temple University, the risks in these sports are not a bad thing: "All great human activity is based on risk-taking." But for Dan Cadey, a professor at California State University, the games are only show and no risk. "These are sports of affluence*, played by kids with enough money for the equipment" he said. "These are kids who want to feel extreme and dangerous, but they still want to be quite safe."
